## ASG mentoring program gives Monash Education students a taste of the classroom

More than 700 first year education students at will get a taste of the classroom through the ASG NEiTA and Monash University mentoring program.

Now in its second year, the pre-service teachers will learn about real life teaching experiences and tap into the wisdom of current and former ASG National Excellence in Teaching Award (NEiTA) recipients, who represent some of the best teachers in Australia.

The mentoring program, between ASG and the Faculty of Education at Monash University is an interactive week where students get to engage with practicing teachers through face-to-face forums, Q&A sessions, workshops and online tutorials.

Our mission is to hopefully reverse the trend of teaching graduates leaving the profession so early on in their careers."

NEiTA Mentoring Programs Leader for semester one, Dr Maria Gindidis from Monash University says the students can expect a dynamic and engaging week long program.





"The feedback which we received from the first year cohort of students last year was really encouraging, so we're hoping to build on that foundation and really give the students a platform where they can learn about effective teaching strategies and discuss professional ethics with practicing teachers who they will hopefully see as mentors and inspire them to the best teachers they can be.

"This year the ASG NEITA and Monash Education mentoring program will run across both semesters and that will help give the students enough time to absorb what they learn and discuss in the workshops and see the links between theory and a real life classroom setting when they start their teaching placements. We also hope the ASG NEITA teachers will be able to foster a passion for education by talking about their awards and how they motivate students' learning."
